# 11-year-old raises funds for Haiti

Elizabeth Nisly a young member of Grace Mennonite, Pandora, Ohio, was so touched by reports she read and saw in the days following the Jan. 12 earthquake in Haiti that she knew she had to do something to help. But the 11-year-old Bluffton sixth grader wasn't in the position to travel to Haiti to volunteer.

So, while helping her dad wash the dishes, she asked if they could do something to raise money for the victims of the earth-quake. The two narrowed their choices down to a dessert event or spaghetti dinner. The spaghetti dinner won, and Elizabeth began planning.

This young girl with a big heart remembered when her family set up a "winter lemonade stand" in front of Et Cetera Shop after the 2004 tsunami in Southeast Asia. They held a fundraiser by selling hot chocolate and cookies to passersby.

This time around, it was Elizabeth's turn to do the planning, with some help from her parents, Lamar and Deborah, her brother, Jonathan 14, and sister, Annelise 8. She chose to hold the dinner after the Jan. 31 service at, Grace Mennonite, Pandora. Based on other dinners held at the church, she estimated there would

# And so the CDC Friends program begins

"Central District Conference is like a family of adult siblings." Perhaps you've heard that somewhere. I heard it again recently at a CDC Regional Meeting. The thinking behind the image is that CDC is made up of congregations mature enough to make their own decisions and interact with each other without a "parent" (conference leadership) telling them what to believe and how to act on their beliefs.

However, as an only child I don't identify at a deep level with the idea of conference as a family of adult siblings, so I've chosen to think of CDC as a network of friends. Not casual friends like the ones I nod to when I pass them on the street, but the ones who carry my history in their hearts and trust me to hold theirs in mine.

We become friends of the heart when we take the time to share our stories, when we believe that our stories tell more about who we are in the core of our being than the way we look or our last names.

Perhaps like me you're old enough to remember a time when the connections between congregations in CDC were strong, based on ethnic ties and shared involvement in conference activities. Today we are, thankfully, more diverse, but our busy lives make it more difficult to find time to get involved in the life of the conference. This challenges us, as conference leaders and members of CDC congregations, to find ways to connect and build relationships.

That's why I'm so excited that eight congregations agreed to be part of the CDC Friends Pilot Program. Friends are volunteers who "are passionate about their congregations and believe in the power of stories to change lives, and who believe in relationships as a foundation for strengthening Christian witness and fellowship." (–CDC Friends Manual).

On a Saturday in January, this new group of Friends came together at Eighth Street Mennonite Church in Goshen, Ind. Perry Bush provided a CDC history lesson and June Alliman Yoder led a series of workshops on listening to and telling stories. The day culminated with each group of Friends sharing a symbol and story of their congregation.

And so the CDC Friends program begins. As in all budding friendships, there's a sense of wondering where these relationships will take us as congregations and as a conference. There is a sense of hope that they will lead us into a deeper understanding of ourselves and each other and of the work Christ calls us to together.

Watch for a report on the Friends Pilot Program at the Annual Meeting in June, and, when a Friend approaches, have your stories ready.

be 150 persons attending. She was close – they had about 130 persons in attendance.

Elizabeth planned a menu of meatless spaghetti, Caesar salad, breadsticks, lemonade and assorted desserts. Knowing that others might want to contribute food, Elizabeth invited the youth of the church to donate desserts. She was right – on the day of the dinner, the dessert table was laden with brownies, cupcakes, poke cake, cherry pie and cookies. Some of the high school and college students baked desserts, as well. There were, in fact, so many that they ended up auctioning off the leftover desserts.

What's a dinner without table decorations? Elizabeth and her Sunday school class cut out paper dolls and glued on clothing cut from scraps donated by quilters at the church. Some of the paper dolls were standing on the table, holding signs that read "Pray for Haiti." Above the donation basket hung a poem Elizabeth had written while waiting for her piano lesson to begin.

Although support from the church was evident well in advance, she decided to do some additional publicity, designing a poster and submitting a note to be included in other church's bulletins.

Deciding how much food to purchase was a bit trickier, but her parents helped her with that. They showed her how to interpret serving sizes on packages and as a result, were left with just one extra bag of spaghetti.

Her family helped her set up the tables and chairs on the Saturday before the event, and Cindy Luginbill and Diane Huber – both of whom are familiar with the church kitchen

– offered their assistance. Others volunteered to help serve, so they set up shifts for serving and clean-up. They saved money by using mostly china and glassware from the church, with minimal amounts of paper products. That, of course, meant lots of dishwashing.

In the end, Elizabeth's event raised over \$4,800. Her parents had paid for all of the ingredients, so that she was able to donate all of the funds to the Mennonite Central Committee's Haitian Relief Project.

Asked how she felt about the project, Elizabeth said, "It makes me feel really good to know that I helped. I'm glad to know that all the money I raised will go to a good cause.

She admits that it was a lot of fun and if there is another natural disaster, she'll likely organize another fundraiser, although "I don't know if I'd do the same thing."

Her parents were pleased that she took the initiative to do this. Her mother said, "It showed that this (the earthquake) was weighing heavily on her mind" in the days following the disaster.

"It was clear how much she was an encouragement, an inspiration. She had a lot of affirmation and encouragement of our church (members)," said Deborah.
