Silverwood MDS crew returns to Louisiana

Yes, there were the 111 yards of concrete poured, there were trenches dug and reinforcing steel placed in them at three house sites....As importantly, we have renewed appreciation for our Anabaptist theological tenet of service to others."

foundation blitz of November 2009.

He imagined a group from Silverwood coming to give the 2010-2011 season another great start.

Roger Claassen agreed to return with his excavation equipment. Over the next several months plans were made, a sequence of work events was scheduled and expectations were formed about the work that would be accomplished.

The net result was that instead of one, there are two houses ready to be framed 8 feet up on their sturdy concrete block columns.

Northwestern Ohio "Brazo en Brazo" continues to assist Hispanic community

Brazo en Brazo (Arm in Arm), a community outreach of CDC congregations Lima Mennonite, First, Bluffton and Grace, along with two Ohio conference Lima-area congregations, reaches approximately 20 families. Jenny Zickafoose of Lima Mennonite, provided the Reporter this update on the program:

Brazo en Brazo connects with people in the Lima community who have emigrated from Spanish-speaking countries since 2004. The group's vision is ongoing discipleship with a focus on social and spiritual needs.

Paul and Ann Conrad continue their work with Brazo en Brazo through weekly Bible classes on Sundays with a worship service following the class. They provide transportation to and from appointments and help in translating for many appointments and provide weekly classes in English.

Columbus January worship focuses on on new year thinking

Columbus Mennonite launched the new year with themes centering on starting fresh.

Ephiphany Sunday's focus affirmed individual wishes to let go of the secrets and untruths that bind.

The focus on Jan. 9 was on the writings of Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., especially the letter to the Birmingham Jail, and thinking about appropriate response as Christians to racism that exists today.

The practice of Firstfruits Giving, an extension of Firstfruits Living became the Jan. 16 focus. Firstfruits Living is a worship activity that flows naturally as a physical expression of the acknowledge of God's place in one's life.

The Jan. 30 worship theme focuses on how light is found in the darkness and how light is shared.

Bell calls attention to God's presence

First, Sugarcreek, Ohio, congregation added a meditative moment to its Dec. 19 worship service.

Several times throughout the worship, a bell sounded to call attention to God's presence.

According to the church bulletin: "This will be followed by a time of silence to slow down the tempo of worship, making hurried space, opening ourselves to God's presence.

"Use these spaces to release daily activities, allow the roar in our minds to quiet and to sink into a place where we can encounter God."

Comins votes to become independent Mennonite congregation

After several years of processing within the congregation, Comins Mennonite Church voted on Oct. 24, 2010, to end its relationship with Central District Conference and Mennonite Church USA. In a letter from their Spiritual Life Board, they expressed concern "about the direction we have observed CDC and MC USA leaning toward in regards to Biblical teachings...."

In October of 2009 board member James Rissler and conference minister Lois Kaufmann met with the congregation to talk about their concerns and relationship with the conference.

Their recent letter expressed gratitude for that visit, for their long-standing relationship with CDC and especially for the assistance they received from CDC churches after the tornado of 1999 destroyed their church building. They will continue as an independent Mennonite congregation.

Earl Zimmerman named Madison interim pastor

Earl Zimmerman became interim pastor at Madison Mennonite this past fall.

In other news related to the congregation, the Mennonite Voluntary Service unit has re-located to a different house in Madison. The unit this year is made up of Ryan Schmidt, Joe Friesen, Andy Shenk and Brent Beachy.

Adult Christian education has studied segments of Ezekiel; a series on Christianity, the Arts, and Moral Decisions; and has had speakers from Iraq Veterans Against War.

Shalom sends care packages to members serving in MCC

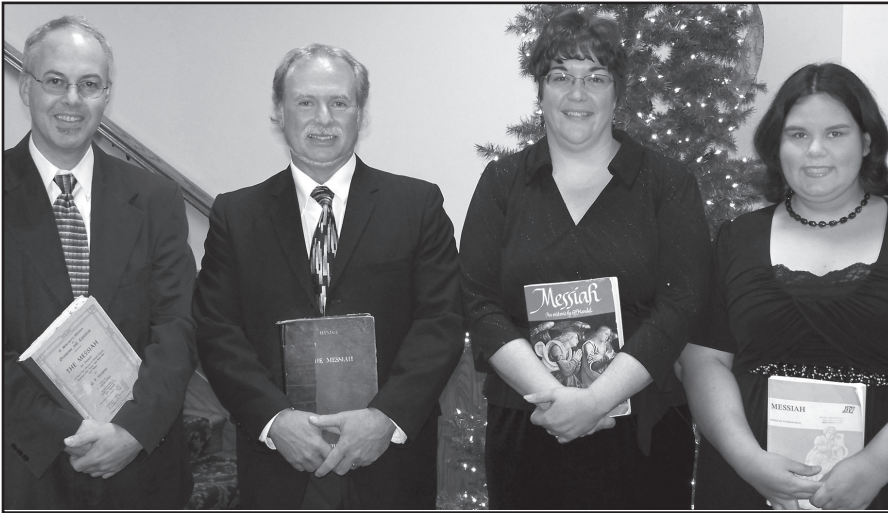
Members of Shalom, Harrisonburg, Va., created care packages in early December for Shalom families serving with Mennonite Central Committee.

Lind tells of MCC's role in World March of Women in Congo

In solidarity with thousands of women who have been sexually assaulted in the Democratic Republic of the Congo, five Mennonite Congolese women joined an international rally of women calling for peace, demilitarization and the end of violence against women, according to Suzanne Lind, who with her husband, Tim, serve as Mennonite Central Committee representatives in Congo. The Linds are member of Florence Church of the Brethren-Mennonite.

This global group of women gathered Oct. 17 for the World March of Women 2010 in Bukavu, the capital of Congo's South Kivu province. MCC sponsored the women's participation to encourage their involvement and interest in the broader church, ecumenical connections and peace and justice issues. The event also allowed Mennonite women from eastern and western Congo to learn to know each other better as they explored issues they can share in their churches.

"In eastern Congo, rape has become a horrible sickness," said Lind. "The sickness is caused by the past 200 years of violent exploitation of the Congolese people, poverty and the world's greed for the country's abundant natural resources.

"The primary purpose of rape (within Congo's war) is to destroy the strongest ties of solidarity within communities, leaving them easy to displace and control," Lind said. "The land then quickly becomes available for mining and the forests for cutting by the strongest group. Motivated by the big money available through the sale of minerals, leaders on all levels (military, local government, national government) encourage and condone violent anarchy as a way to make money and remain in power."

Faith holds intergenerational knitting nights

A weekly intergenerational knitting night is taking place this winter by members of Faith congregation. The weekly sessions last from 7 to 8:30 p.m. "It's a way we learn to know each other better over knitting, tea and conversation," said Gwen Gustafson-Zook.

The Conrads volunteer in this ministry but are reimbursed for their travel expenses.

Recently Marti Meza has taken a more active role helping the Conrads. Meza works with the ministry nearly 12 hours each week. She helps with supportive services to the Hispanic families and individuals through evangelism and social networking.

The Conrads are testimony to the ministry of those directly affected by the social and spiritual needs of the Hispanic community.

Weekly updates are offered to churches who help fund Brazo en Brazo's costs for printing in bulletins.

"The Conrads are testimony to the ministry of those directly affected by the social and spiritual needs of the Hispanic community. They often tell the story of a person or family who has experienced help and

support of Brazo en Brazo," said Zickafoose.

"The concept of giving and receiving is important in the ministry and this year's theme has been 'Opening Opportunities,' which includes the encouragement of cross cultural exchanges.

Financial support in 2010 came from supporting Mennonite congregations and individual donations of \$5,734, an annual fall Fiesta \$600 monetary gift; and contributions from CDC and Ohio Mennonite Conference of nearly \$7,000.
