Janet Rasmussen, pastor of First, Champaign-Urbana, went homeless this winter. And it was one cold winter night.

Her experience was part of a one-night event to raise awareness around homelessness in Champaign-Urbana. It was also used to collect funds to underwrite the housing provided by C-U at Home, an organization working to house and support homeless people in Champaign-Urbana.

Rasmussen was among 75 community members who camped outside in boxes from 6 p.m. to 6 a.m. on Feb. 1. The awareness event took place at the University of Illinois Quad and downtown Champaign.

There were more than 200 volunteers involved in helping out at the two locations. This event shows what can happen when a community comes together behind a meaningful cause as it topped its goal of \$50,000 raised, according to Rasmussen.

MC USA's Purposeful Plan

Greetings from Atlanta.

I hope that many of you have some familiarity with Mennonite Church USA's Purposeful Plan, approved by delegates at Pittsburgh 2011. This plan is based on reflecting on six questions:

- Who is God calling us to become as a people?
- Where is God calling us to go?
- What are the signposts to show we are on God's chosen path for us?
 - Where are we now on this journey?
 - What circumstances might cause us to make adjustments to our goals along the way?
 - What are the next steps on the path?

And the answers to these questions are centered on seven priorities intended to guide our missional work. The first three articulate foundations of what it means to be an Anabaptist congregation, and the latter four identify areas that we want to focus on over a 10-year period. The priorities are:

- Christian Formation
- Christian Community
- Holistic Christian Witness
- Stewardship
- Leadership Development
- Undoing Racism and Advancing Intercultural Transformation
- Church-to-Church Relationships

A summary of the Purposeful Plan, including references to Scriptures that ground these priorities, and how they interact with our Confession of Faith in a Mennonite Perspective, are available at: <http://mennoniteusa.org/about/purposeful-plan/>. There are also study guides for each of these priorities and for the questions above that small groups or Sunday School classes could use to reflect on them in their context.

This year, MC USA and CDC are especially focusing on the priorities of Christian Formation and Undoing Racism and Advancing Intercultural Transformation. The latter will get a lot of attention at Phoenix 2013, and I'm looking forward to going on one of the day-long border learning tours that are being offered to learn more about the impacts

of U.S. immigration policies. In CDC, leadership has engaged this priority over the past months by sending members of the Board and Ministerial Committee to a Damascus Road anti-racism training at Bluffton, sending Lynda Nyce to Chicago for a training on assisting immigrants in adjusting to life in the U.S. called *Bienvenido*, and both she and Lois to Communities of Hope, a training on intercultural transformation. On a congregational level, Hively Avenue and Community Mennonite, Markham, have a Reign of God grant to "Walk a mile in my shoes," a May 4 event where members of both congregations will gather in Markham to walk and pray in that community while sharing stories and reflecting on what it means to be the body of Christ across racial, gender and class differences.

CDC's two year theme – God's Story, Our Stories – has nicely dovetailed with the priority of Christian Formation, and we have done more as a conference related to this. Those who have attended regional gatherings have appreciated Ron Guengerich's leading us in reflecting on Scripture, especially on the overwhelming sense of God's provision and grace in the Old Testament. And at each of those gatherings, we have used a communion liturgy developed by Cincinnati Mennonite Fellowship as part of the "12 Scriptures Project" (<http://mennoniteusa.org/2012/03/22/the-twelve-scriptures-project/>) being encouraged by MC USA during this "Year of the Bible." Other congregations (including Atlanta Mennonite Fellowship) have also engaged that process and found it richly rewarding in the ways that we have found ourselves working with biblical texts in new ways.

The direction that our denominational leadership and delegates have given in adopting the Purposeful Plan and encouraging us to focus on these seven priorities seems very good to me. It is good for us to focus on these priorities rather than our disagreements, and we should work at these while we also do the hard and holy work of discerning together God's will on controversial topics. I hope that we will all take the time to learn more about the Purposeful Plan and experiment with the denominational initiatives around it as we continually seek to be conduits of God's healing and hope for all people.

Traveling the U.S. and Canada with the MCC mobile canning crew

Andrew Keeler probably cans turkeys in his sleep. That's because when he's awake and on the job, he helps process up to 5,000 2-pound cans of turkey meat per day.

Keeler, a member of St. John, Pandora, and 2012 Bluffton University grad, is part of the four-person Mennonite Central Committee (MCC) mobile canning crew.

For seven months each year the crew travels the United States and Canada pulling a 42-foot trailer equipped with all the canning equipment necessary for the job. During the other five months, the crew stays in Akron, Pa., the home base of the canning project.

The mobile meat canner operates in 33 different locations across the United States and Canada, from October through May. Over 10,000 volunteers a year fill, weigh, stack, wash and label every can.

Over the 2011-2012 season, the collective efforts of all involved produced 556,586 cans (over a million pounds of meat).

The finished product is shipped around the world, feeding hungry people, and investing in the future of those in need.

"I graduated from Bluffton University in 2012 and wanted to get involved in a volunteer assignment," said Keeler. He applied and was accepted by MCC for a two-year volunteer term with its portable canning operation.

So far, Keeler has visited 13 states and two Canadian provinces.

"The food we can goes overseas to the Ukraine and North Korea. We've also shipped some turkey to Haiti," said Keeler.

At Bluffton University, where he majored in history, he participated in "Shining Through." Keeler is the son of Randy and Karen Keeler of Bluffton.

First nine months CDC giving report

We are two-thirds of the way through our fiscal year and the numbers continue to look good. Revenue (giving) is slightly ahead of our plan and expenses are under the budgeted expenses for year-to-date. Giving from congregations is \$5,685 ahead, other giving is \$650 more than planned and earned revenues are \$1,336 ahead for a total above-plan amount of \$7,661 year-to-date. Expenses through Feb. 28 were \$6,179 below the planned amount, so the net amount that we are ahead totals \$13,840. That feels very good and we hope the strong support continues so we are able to close the year on June 30 with a gain.
