# Journey program invites active leaders into further study

Development Program is a non-credit program for people preparing for ministry. Central District Conference, along with Indiana-Michigan Mennonite Conference, sponsors this program, which is offered by Anabaptist Mennonite Biblical Seminary. Study involves coursework done online, meetings with a local pastoral mentor at least every other week, and twice-a-year gatherings with all participants.

Currently two members of the conference and their mentors are participating. JP Schumacher, First Mennonite, Bluffton, and Dennis Miller, Silverwood Mennonite Church, are students. Each has a mentor—Gloria Bucher for JP, and John Heyerly for Dennis—as they work through the five units of study.

These participants reflect for *focus* on why they are involved and the benefits to them and their congregations.

#### **Dennis Miller**

've been in construction my entire working life and have always had this desire to work in

My mentee readily takes responsibility in the church, which means he does much of what he always did, plus taking opportunities to teach adult Christian education classes. He will also join the church board in 2018, probably in part because his Journey participation is frequently mentioned.
