Annual Meeting: "Come, walk with us. Tell us your story."

With the invitation to walk together and listen to each other's stories, the Central District Conference Annual Meeting will begin on Thursday, June 21, and continue through noon on Saturday, June 23, in Goshen, Ind.

The central Bible text for the gathering is Acts 16:6-15, which recounts how Paul, Timothy and Silas encountered both a closed door and a welcoming invitation in their missionary journeys.

Three worship services will draw on themes in this text:

- The Divine "No"—shared by Nina Lanctot, spiritual director and recently retired pastor of Florence Church of the Brethren Mennonite;
- Host as friend, enemy, stranger, guest shared by John Powell, pastor, strategic planning consultant and mission advocate;
- The Divine "Yes"—shared by Jonathan Larson, storyteller, pastor and former mission worker in Africa.

Many stories of ministries and congregational life are included in the schedule. We will hear from congregations with long histories in the conference and congregations asking to become part of the conference.

For those who want to be more active, the

fundraisers on Thursday afternoon—golfing, biking, running, walking—are good ways to discover some of the unique flavor of the Goshen community.

All are welcome to attend any part of the Annual Meeting and are invited to join the fellowship, worship and learning. The hosts are the Goshen and Elkhart area congregations, and most sessions will be held in College Mennonite Church on the campus of Goshen College.

The finances of Central District Conference remain strong thanks to everyone. At the end of June I'll be finishing my time as your treasurer. It's been an honor and privilege to serve you these past years.

Congregational giving is a bit of a concern; we have received about \$11,000 less than the plan. Giving by families and individuals has remained ahead of the plan—\$21,051 compared to the goal of \$19,167. Thank you! Expenses are running about \$7,000 less than the spending plan through April so in total, we're right at break-even.

Thanks again for all you do contributing your time, talent and resources to our Central District Conference.

Doug's Mug: Change

I have change in my mug. I used to put my loose change in a mug that I kept on my bedroom dresser. It was always fun to drop in a penny, dime or quarter that I found along the sidewalk or in the garden. When the mug was full, I'd take it to the bank.



I have a different kind of change in my mug these days and it has pretty much filled my mug. What I'm talking about is change within Mennonite Church USA leadership. Take a sip and here's what you might taste.

April 30 was the last

day for Ervin Stutzman in his role as Executive Director of MC USA. Ervin has retired after a lifetime of faithful service to the church. His depth of knowledge of Anabaptist history, his positive presence, and his various involvements in the formation of MC USA have served us well. On May 1, Glen Guyton began as Executive Director of the denomination. Glen has served in denominational leadership since 2009, most recently as Chief Operating Officer and Director of Convention Planning. Glen provided much of the energy and vision behind the Future Church Summit at our Orlando Convention last summer. I look forward to Glen's leadership as he is deeply committed to Christ and the way of peace.

April 30 was also retirement day for Nancy Kauffmann as Denominational Minister. She has been an incredible resource to CDC, assisting with pastoral transitions, managing the pastor data base, providing leadership to Healthy Boundaries initiatives and providing wise counsel on a variety of topics. She was also a faithful prayer partner for CDC. Sue Park-Hur began as Denominational Minister for Leadership Development in April. I have already observed Sue's commitment to developing strong pastoral leadership, her positive presence, attention to detail and faithful vision.

On May 31, **Terry Shue** will step down as Denominational Minister and Director of Leadership Development. I have valued Terry's enthusiasm, commitment to the church and positive presence. Serving in a similar but somewhat revised role will be **Michael Danner**. His title is Associate Executive Director for Church Vitality and Engagement and he will begin June 1. Michael and I have built a strong peer relationship over the past two years in his current position of Executive Conference Minister of Illinois Mennonite Conference and I look forward to building upon this good relationship in his new role.

Shana Peachey Boshart will begin in an expanded role of Denominational Minister for Faith Formation on August 1. In this position she will develop resources that nurture Christian formation and Anabaptist theological identity, as well as supervise seminars, worship and other formational events related to MC USA's biennial convention. Shana is an excellent leader and communicator and is committed to faith formation in the church.

Central District appoints four members to the Bluffton University Board of Trustees and I also serve as a Trustee representing MC USA. I am grateful for **Dr. James Harder's** 12 years of faithful service as president of Bluffton University. He has led the school well during a period of rapid change and challenge in higher education. Jim will retire June 30. On July 1 we will welcome **Dr. Jane Wood** as president. Jane brings a breadth of educational and leadership experience in Christian liberal arts schools, and I am struck by her vision and commitment to the way of peace as a core value rooted in her Christian faith.

These are just some of the changes in MC USA. Please pray for both those stepping out of leadership and those picking up the mantle of leadership. While change is bittersweet, I am excited and optimistic by the opportunities and possibilities for this small but significant part of God's church known as Mennonite Church USA. And you can take that to the bank!
