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A Message from Doug Luginbill Conference Minister

Dear CDC Delegates and Annual Meeting Participants,

Thank you for your participation in worship, fellowship, and discernment. One decision that we always make at Annual Meeting is the approval of a spending plan. Next year's spending plan represents a 10% increase from our 2025-2026 spending plan. Much of this increase is due to including the Associate Conference Minister's expenses in the spending plan. For the last three years, this has been covered by the *Tending Transformation Campaign*.

In December of 2021 the CDC Board initiated a three-year, \$350,000 *Tending Transformation Campaign* that focused on the following four goals:

- Support a part-time Associate Conference Minister to resource emerging communities of faith
- Mevelop a Grant Program to support emerging communities of faith
- Provide clergy development grants and seminary scholarships for current and future pastors
- **%** Provide support for a Missional Activities Fund.

As of May 22, we have received \$345,000 with an additional \$6,500 in outstanding pledges. We are grateful for the generosity of over 100 donors that made this possible!

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In January of 2023, Matt Prichard began as our Associate Conference Minister. Matt and our Missional Church Committee have provided excellent leadership to two emerging communities of faith; Moveable Feast, Chicago, IL and The Intention Church, a completely online congregation. Matt has also been an excellent support to some of our newer congregations and congregations who are seeking renewal or revitalization.

Matt's ministry and the work of the Missional Church Committee are helping us meet our overall mission as a conference including "Supporting missional partnerships that make God's reign visible and fostering ministries of evangelism, peace, healing, and hope."

The CDC Board is committed to continuing the Associate Conference Minister position into the future. Through a slight increase in requests from congregations and increasing our individual contributions from \$50,000 to \$66,000 (a 32% increase), we believe we can fund this position through our annual Spending Plan.

Enclosed is an outline of a strategy that will help us meet our Spending Plan. Please consider being one of our supporters that will help us reach our Spending Plan goal. Jessica is what you might call chronically online. Years ago, Jessica stumbled upon Trey Ferguson on twitter. His continual refrain "love is committed to wholeness" resonated with her. Her journey to finding a spiritual home had been marked by experiences of exclusion and the need to hide parts of herself. She was excited to learn that Trey was launching The Intention Church and that she could be a part of it.

Trey serves as pastor of The Intention Church, an online peace church community that's part of Central District Conference. Jessica joined this congregation at its very beginning last fall. What she found was a deeply accepting space, the kind of community she had desperately needed, where she could be her authentic self without fear of judgment. The Intention Church distinguishes itself by embracing diversity in all its forms, celebrating LGBTQ+ individuals, and prioritizing open and honest dialogue. This commitment creates a profound sense of safety and belonging, welcoming people from a variety of church backgrounds who share a passion for peacemaking and justice in the world. Within this

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community, made up of people gathered from across the globe, vulnerability is met with compassion, questions are encouraged, and both joys and sorrows are shared openly. At The Intention Church "I haven't had to fracture any parts of my identity," Jessica reflected. She has finally discovered a place where she feels genuinely seen, heard, and valued, a community built on authenticity, connection, and shared purpose.


I have felt my being crack and fracture. tucking away the parts of myself the people who swore to love me would sneer at, would condemn. would simply not understand.

In the Thick of Things

Ted was raised in the Mennonite tradition and took a meandering path through different Christian traditions before finding a home at Grand Rapids Mennonite Fellowship. Over time, he grew uneasy with certain elements in the evangelical and charismatic circles he'd experienced, such as the celebration of nationalism and justification of war. He also wrestled with how specific scriptures applied to the lives of LGBTQ+ individuals.

When he began connecting to Grand Rapids Mennonite Fellowship, they provided a counter-narrative to Ted's previous experiences, modeling a serious commitment to justice, peace, and following Jesus. The fellowship's environment encouraged Ted to fully embrace inclusion and to actively engage in addressing social issues. The authenticity and vulnerability of the community fostered a deep sense of connection and mutual respect. Ted is deeply appreciative of the leadership of Alaina Dobkowski and Susan Kragt.

Now Ted feels deeply connected to the fellowship and expresses that "Christ is more present in my life in our gatherings than

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Missing Connection

Ben grew up in the Mennonite tradition, with his mother's side of the family deeply rooted in the Mennonite church in places like Kansas and Idaho. However, he became disconnected from the church when he moved to Michigan. Despite his grandmother's efforts to reconnect him by sharing an article about Grand Rapids Mennonite Fellowship, Ben didn't initially engage.

Grand Rapids Mennonite Fellowship became an agent of change in Ben's life when attending his grandmother's funeral inspired him to seek out a faith-based community. Witnessing the strong community come together for the funeral made him miss that connection in his own life. This longing prompted him to visit Grand Rapids Mennonite Fellowship, where he soon began to connect with others.

Since February 2024, Ben has been regularly attending the fellowship. He values plugging back into a community with connections to MC USA and Anabaptism. Ben is also actively involved in developing the children's ministry, which is important to him. He finds it meaningful to express faith through deeds,

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many churches and in college. They yearned for a space where their children could witness an authentic representation of Jesus's boundless love and acceptance.

Before finding Moveable Feast, their search for a church in Chicago was characterized by uncertainty and a struggle to identify a community that aligned with their evolving understanding of faith. They visited 12 churches in their search without success. The accumulated hurt from past church experiences, including the sting of power abuse, cast a long shadow, making the prospect of finding a truly safe and welcoming space feel daunting.

Since joining Moveable Feast less than a year ago, Liann and her family have experienced firsthand the transformative power of a truly inclusive community. The focus on shared purpose – to love their neighbors and make a tangible difference for the marginalized – has provided a sense of belonging and purpose that was previously missing. Moveable Feast's emphasis on a cocreated community, where everyone has a voice, has resonated deeply with their desire to move beyond hierarchical structures and experience an authentic, lived-out faith. The community's embrace of interfaith connections has further fostered a sense of expansive welcome. In Liann's words, the experience has been "really transformative" and "really healing," bringing her to tears of gratitude.
